Alumni Profiles Lack Shanafelt '54

Penn's Last Football All-American

In the fall of 1953, his senior year, Brother Jack Shanafelt '54 attained All-American honors as a tackle on the Penn football team. Because players filled both offensive and defensive roles at that time, the All-American team was made up of only 11 players, making it more difficult to achieve such recognition.

Shanafelt is Penn's last All-American football player. Why did you join Sigma Alpha Epsilon?

I was from Akron, Ohio, and there was a fellow from Canton, Ohio, who had a car, while I didn't. He found out that I was on the freshman football team on scholarship and offered to give me a ride home for the holidays. I said fine! He belonged to SAE, and I had a natural "in" through him. He was a year ahead of me and was already in the fraternity. I checked it out. It was unique at the university because it wasn't one of the "jock fraternities." I figured that I had spent enough time with the jocks with football practice, meetings and games, so I decided on a fraternity where I could be with people who had other ideas, ambitions and thoughts. It gave me a little balance.

What is your favorite memory of the fraternity?

One of the highlights was playing Georgia during my junior year. Miss America was from Georgia that year, and she was at the game on the Georgia side. There was a place at the end of the stadium where friends and family could wait for players after the game while we showered. When I went in there, Miss America was there, so I started chatting with her. I told her I was an SAE, which is an old Southern fraternity, and asked her if she would like to go up to the fraternity house. To make a long story short, she agreed and her chaperone even let her come alone. Everyone had to come over and meet her. It was fun and one of those things you don't expect. Of course, I got ribbed and razzed by my teammates. When we were going over game films, someone made the comment, "Where was Shanafelt on that one?" He was indicating that I had made a mistake on the play. But one of the other guys said, "Oh, that was when he was over on the sideline making his date with Miss America!" But that's part of the fun. During my senior year, strange as it may seem, Miss America was from Philadelphia, and she was dating one of the fellows on the team. She married him. It's funny to think that I've met two Miss Americas.

What kind of influence has the fraternity had on your life since graduation?

The fraternity gave us a large social structure. There were about 40 of us who lived there, and we were a big, happy family. It helped me to grow and get along with other people from all parts of the country. We all came from different backgrounds and experiences.

With whom do you stay in contact?

I stay in touch with George Balbach '53; he was a wrestler. When I was with

Goodrich and was traveling all over the country, I would try to get in touch with people who might be there.

What other activities did you enjoy in college?

Football was my main extracurricular. I was a tackle on the line, playing some offense and some defense each year. My senior year, I usually played all 60 minutes. I started every game I ever played in. There were articles about "Ironman Shanafelt," but I was fortunate that I was never injured badly enough to miss games. The worst thing that happened to me was that I broke my nose a couple of times. I was lineman of the week a couple of times, and one time coach grabbed me and told me we were going up to New York to do a couple of sports shows, which was nice.

My junior year I was Honorable Mention All-American. I was All-American in my senior year. And at that time, all of the All-Americans were on the "Jackie Gleason Show." We were on one Saturday night. It was interesting because Gleason was quite a character and was in charge of everything on the show. He insisted that everything be authentic, which meant he wanted us all in our full uniforms, including cleats. It is not easy to jog on the stage in cleats. We were on after a group of dancers, so the floor was slippery. Believe it or not, nobody fell.

Did you live in the house? If so, who were your roommates? Tell us about a memorable time with them.

Yes, I lived in the house. I had one roommate, Jim Cartwright '55, and he was from Youngstown, Ohio. That worked out well for traveling home for the holidays. Cash is Not the Only Answer

The Penn Theta House Corporation is always appreciative of your contributions. Additionally, brothers who have included the Penn Theta Chapter in their estate plans have made a thoughtful gesture toward the fraternity and have established a method for supporting the organization in the future.

While SAE can't provide legal counsel, advanced technical support, complicated trust agreements, or a thorough knowledge of tax laws, we can, however, promote the idea that a simple bequest — a gift to SAE in your will — is a method of supporting the fraternity in a significant way.

For example, did you know that the Penn Theta Chapter can be included in your will with only a minimal amount of wording? All that is necessary is the language to include the correct legal name and address of the fraternity.

A simple example of an outright or general bequest would be: "I give, devise and bequeath to the Pennsylvania Theta Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity located at 3908 Spruce Street, Philadelphia, PA 19104, the sum of \$X (or, X percent of my estate) to be used for general purposes (or to establish a scholarship, for physical plant maintenance, etc.).

A portion of your residuary estate — whatever is left after specific bequests have been paid — can also be designated to the Penn Theta Chapter. Sample wording to do this would be: "All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, both real and personal property of whatever and wheresoever situated, which I may own or have the right to dispose of at the time of my death, I give, devise and bequeath to the Pennsylvania Theta Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity located at 3908 Spruce Street, Philadelphia, PA 19104, to be used for X reason.

Using this sample language can greatly reduce the potential for legal disputes during probate. It can be shared with your attorney should you be interested in providing for the Penn Theta Chapter in your estate plans.
