Penn Searches for New President

For those of you who have been reading my biannual letters for the past 17 years, you know that I keep my basic message simple and consistent — "Show your support for SAE by sending money." However, every few years I use my fraternal soapbox for a more meaningful communication.

On June 20, 2003, Dr. Judith Rodin announced her intent to step down from the presidency of Penn in June 2004. The executive committee of the trustees appointed a Consultative Committee for the Selection of a President, chaired by Trustee Chairman James S. Riepe. Comprised of trustees, faculty members and students, the consultative committee is to present a roster of at least three candidates to the executive committee. The executive committee will in turn present its recommendations to the full board of trustees. The new president will be confirmed in early 2004 and will assume office in July 2004.

As an alumnus of both Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Penn, I want the next president of the university to be pro-Greek. If Penn's new president is opposed to the continued existence of Greek organizations, then I foresee the demise of most fraternities and sororities at Penn within 15 years.

To me, a pro-Greek candidate will be someone who was Greek during their undergraduate days, and who is therefore naturally sympathetic to Greek life, who shows support for the positive contributions that Greeks make on campus (especially philanthropic endeavors), who makes decisions on campus policy affecting Greeks with the consideration and consultation of the Greek community, who includes Greek leaders (undergraduate, chapter advisers, national offices) in important university decisions (like selecting the next president), who ensures adequate funding for organizations that support Greek life (e.g., the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs, the Interfraternity Council, the Bicultural Inter-Greek Council and Panhellenic Council), who ensures "open" management of the Greek system including conflict resolution, who participates in Greeksponsored events and who is willing to

work with national Greek organizations.

I also will demand that the new president repeal the "collective responsibility" rules that apply only to members of fraternities and sororities. This clear example of bias against Greeks has galled me for years.

An anti-Greek candidate would develop campus policies that impact the Greek system without Greek input, will refer to unfavorable Greek system attributes without acknowledging the positive aspects and merits, will allow the closure of fraternity and sorority chapters without supporting the establishment of new ones, will give sororities and fraternities incomplete details of relevant issues and will continue the status quo of inadequate/unequal funding of the Greek system, including housing budgets.

Dr. Rodin has shown no bias during her tenure. However, her laissez-faire approach to Greeks has allowed the entrenched anti-Greek elements within the university to continue their war of attrition against the system. A pro-Greek president will dampen overt anti-Greek agitation in the near term. In the long term, pro-Greek individuals will be able to survive within the institution to become integral parts of both the administration and the faculty. My ultimate goal is to change the essence of the university's career administrators and tenured faculty in order to save the Greek system.

I spent several hours at the house during homecoming. Despite feeling relatively old, I enjoyed myself. In 20 years, I still want to be able to stop by the house, quaff a cheap beer, reminisce over the old composites and bore the undergraduates with my stories! I believe most of us feel the same way. Is There a Mentor in You?

Have you ever been responsible for hiring someone? If you have, you know that the process can be complex and something not to be taken lightly. In fact, often several people are involved in the process.

As we think about building a strong, progressive chapter, the quality of our team is just as critical. So, why leave it all up to the rush chairman? Why leave the undergraduates responsible for squeezing in these priorities among the countless others they already have? Why not help?

Rush — or recruitment — was once considered to be a process that lasted only a few weeks and left a chapter in a very reactive position. In attempts to become more proactive and in control of the results, we are appealing to you — our brothers — to play an integral part in the growth and sustenance of the chapter. No matter where you live, you can make a difference.

Have you considered referring potential rushees to our chapter? Often chapters struggle to find quality men through their existing recruitment processes.
