Call to Arms

The Board Needs Your Support

For too long, we have all depended on a few (too few) individuals to provide the bulk of the active alumni involvement with the chapter. We all counted on these volunteers to rally support when needed, to make sure the basic fiscal structure was intact and to make those well-placed phone calls that would bail out the chapter in a time of need.

However, chapter operations at both the undergraduate and house corporation levels have become increasingly complex. This has been driven by internal and external factors. Internally, the general fraternity and the chapter have set high standards for operations. These standards are driven in part by our own goals but also by the external factors. All fraternities now must deal with state and local regulatory requirements that we alumni didn't even contemplate as undergraduates, not to mention the litigious environment in which we all now live. Lastly, all Greek organizations need to meet and maintain everincreasing operating standards imposed upon them by their host colleges.

Continuing the current alumni support model — which depends on one or two brothers carrying most of the load as advisers, landlords and business agents — is unrealistic. This would only guarantee the burnout of the volunteer brothers and our jumping from crisis to crisis.

The short and simple of it is this: We, as alumni, must adjust our involvement to meet the current needs of the chapter. Toward this end, we are asking each and every one of you to please consider joining the alumni board. We are looking for a dedicated (Continued on Page 6)
