Harris Great Hall was inaugurated in honor of **Josh Harris** '86, the campaign's top donor. A plaque was also installed at the house to permanently recognize all campaign contributors.











CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Renovations Begin at Penn Theta

Alumni Campaign Donations Allow for Repair of Butler's Pantry and Other Needed Improvement Projects

Thanks to overwhelming support of our

capital campaign, which raised \$400,000, work has begun to make critically necessary repairs at the Penn Theta chapter house. Our top donors were recognized at Homecoming 2013 and will become a permanent part of the house through a donor's plaque that was installed.

Work began last summer, with the first project being the repair to the Butler's Pantry



(which was about to collapse!). Pictured

Renovation Projects Supported by Your Gifts:

- Repair to the Butler Pantry (which was about to collapse) *Project Complete!*
- Repair of the foyer floor (which almost collapsed)
- Fixing the brick façade and landscaping
- Repair the fire escape to bring it up to code
- A major overhaul of the electrical system (also to bring it up to code)
- Refurbishment of the heating systems
- Minor items (carpet, plumbing)

Being Positive: Brothers Bond Together to Help Others

Penn Theta Raises \$2,500 to Benefit Pediatric Cancer Foundation, Connects with Local School Children and Feeds the Hungry

Penn Theta kicked off the spring semester strong, following a banner fall. The chapter recruited 21 new members, six of whom are varsity athletes. Find a list of their names, majors and hometowns at www.saepath.org.

Brothers spent the fall increasing SAE's presence on campus. We started in August, offering a move-in service for returning students and collected optional donations. More than 70 brothers helped move 80 students and raised \$2,500 for the B+ Foundation, an organization that awards research grants and assistance to families fighting pediatric cancer. Through this foundation, we adopted an honorary brother, Antonio, a seven-year-old boy who is battling brain cancer. Additional

philanthropy events included collecting 75 pounds of canned food during Parents' Weekend to benefit Philabundance, the Philadelphia region's largest food bank and hunger relief organization, and our annual Haunted House for more than 200 West Philadelphia elementary school students.

This spring, the chapter is launching an academic mentorship program for older brothers to offer coursework support, schedule planning and career advice to younger brothers and new members. We received an award from Sigma Alpha Epsilon for academic achievement.

Following our largest Homecoming celebration in recent memory, we look forward



"Our Brotherhood is Our Biggest Asset"

Charles Wetherbee Learns Life Lessons and Character-Developing Values at SAE's 2013 Leadership School

Charles Wetherbee attended the 78th John

O. Moseley Leadership School last summer, which was held at sea after departing from the Port of Miami. Charles benefitted from three full days of workshops, group discussions, and speaker events focused around the topic of Leadership for Life,

which stresses the importance of staying involved with SAE as an alumnus. Attendees also had the opportunity to explore Nassau during the trip, which Charles says was a blast for the 800 brothers in attendance.

In what ways did the Leadership School prepare you to better lead SAE?

The most meaningful was the reinforcement that our chapter at Pennsylvania is just one of several hundred chapters around the country that share a common set of traditions and values despite very different campus environments. More than just reading about it in the *Phoenix*, meeting and interacting

with brothers from each of our 228 chapters encouraged me to lead our chapter not just for our current undergraduates, but for our alumni and brothers from other chapters as well so that SAE may endure for years to come. Every chapter has experiences that others can learn from and incorporate to improve their daily operations, whether in the areas of social, philanthropy, academic, or alumni engagement.

In what ways did Leadership School prepare you for life outside of SAE?

One of the best things about Leadership School is the ability to make lasting connections with brothers from around the country. Many sessions stressed the importance of expanding your network and building bonds, both professionally and personally. I try to act on this advice every day, be it with SAEs, classmates, colleagues, or friends.

Why is it important that alumni support the chapter's efforts to send undergraduate brothers to Leadership School on a continuous basis?

I would not have been able to attend

Leadership School without our generous alumni, and I would like to express my appreciation for their support. On our campuses, it is easy to forget that we are just a small piece of a national brotherhood, but the ability to see the bigger picture at Leadership School inspires us to be more active brothers and, in a few years, alumni. The outstanding alumni speakers and Leadership School staff exposed many brothers in attendance to the lifelong value of fraternity for the first time. Our experience at Leadership School inspired many of us to give back by becoming members of the Phi Alpha Club, an important first step in what I am confident will be a lasting tradition of giving back to our fraternity.

What is the #1 thing you learned from Leadership School?

Our brotherhood is our biggest asset. We are fortunate to be able to learn from the experiences of the True Gentlemen who have come before us, and we are charged with the responsibility of challenging future generations of brothers so that our fraternity may continue to grow stronger.
